ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE

ORDINANCE REGULATING GARBAGE AND RUBBISH

WHEREAS, the Village of Amanda finds it to be in the interests of the health, safety, and welfare of its residents, to control the means and manner of storing garbage and rubbish within the limits of said Village;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Village of Amanda, Ohio:

SECTION I - Definitions

1. That for the purpose of this ordinance the following definitions shall apply: The term "garbage" shall be interpreted to mean all putrescible waste except sewage and body waste, including vegetable and animal offal and carcasses of small dead animals, but excluding recognizable industrial bi-products, and shall include all such substances from all public and private establishments and from all residences.

2. The term "rubbish" shall be interpreted to mean ashes, bottles, broken glass, crockery, tin cans, cast iron, printed matter, paper, boots, shoes, hats and other clothing. It does not, however, include any material in the nature of earth, sand, brick, stone, plaster, ashes, or other substance that may accumulate as a result of building operations.

3. The word "householder" shall mean the head of a family or one maintaining his or her separate living room or quarters on premises and shall include owners, tenants, and occupants of all premises, upon which garbage or rubbish or both, is or are created.

4. The word "premises" shall mean land or buildings, or both, or parts of either or both, occupied by one householder or commercial establishment.

5. The words "commercial establishments" shall mean and include all other premises and institutions, public or private, charitable or noncharitable, upon which garbage or rubbish, or both, is or are created.

SECTION II - GARBAGE CANS

It shall be the duty of each householder or commercial establishment in or upon premises within the Village where garbage is created or allowed to be, to procure and to keep available for the exclusive use of such premises or the part thereof occupied by the householder or commercial establishment, a closed container to hold all the garbage created or accumulated thereon between garbage collections and pending its removal.

ORDINANCE NO. 86-3

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO MIDWEST COMMUNICATIONS CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, INC., AN OHIO CORPORATION, THE NON-EXCLUSIVE RIGHT AND FRANCHISE TO ERECT, MAINTAIN, OPERATE IN, UNDER, OVER, ALONG, ACROSS, AND UPON THE STREETS, LANES, AVENUES, SIDEWALKS, ALLEYS, BRIDGES AND HIGHWAYS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES IN THE VILLAGE OF AMANDA, OHIO, AND SUBSEQUENT ADDITIONS THERETO FOR THE PURPOSE OF TRANSMISSION AND DISTRIBUTION BY CABLE OF TELEVISION SIGNALS TO ENABLE SALE OF THEIR COMMUNITY ANTENNA TELEVISION SERVICE TO THE INHABITANTS OF SAID VILLAGE OF AMANDA, OHIO, AND OTHER PURPOSES, FOR A PERIOD OF FIFTEEN (15) YEARS, AND REGULATING THE SAME.

Be It Ordained by the Council of the Village of Amanda, State of Ohio, a majority of the members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1: GRANT OF AUTHORITY

In consideration of the faithful performance and observance of the conditions and reservations hereinabout specified, the right is hereby granted to MIDWEST COMMUNICATIONS CONSTRUCTION CO., INC, an Ohio Corporation, and hereinafter referred to as "The Company", the non-exclusive right to erect, maintain and operate television transmission and distribution facilities, and additions hereto, in, under, over, along, across, and upon the streets, lanes, avenues, sidewalks, alleys, subsequent additions thereto, for the purpose of the transmission and distribution of audio and visual impulses and television energy in accordance with the laws and regulations of the United States of America and the State of Ohio and the ordinances and regulations of the Village of Amanda, Ohio, for a period of fifteen (15) years, with the option to renew this franchise at the end of the said fifteen (15) year period for an additional term of fifteen (15) years according to the same terms and conditions as set forth in this agreement.

SECTION 2: DEFINITION

Wherever used in this ordinance, the "television" shall mean a system for the transmission of audio signals and/or visual images by means of electrical impulses.

SECTION 3: USE OF EXISTING POLE LINE FACILITIES

There is hereby granted the further right, privilege and authority to The Company to lease, rent or in any other manner obtain the use of tower, poles, lines, cables and other public utilities, to use such poles, tower, lines, cables, and other equipment and facilities, subject to all existing and future ordinances and regulations of the Village of Amanda, Ohio. Such use shall be in such manner as to save the Village harmless thereby and thereon. The poles used for The Company's distribution system shall be those erected and maintained by the existing public utilities when and where practicable, providing mutually satisfactory rental agreements can be entered into with such companies. In areas or locations where underground conduit is used

by the utility company, The Company by negotiation with such company, will join in the use of the underground facilities.

Should the Village, as a result of its own desires and initiatives or as part of urban renewal, redevelopment, city beautifications or any other reason, decide that utility wires should be entrenched underground, such relocation will be done at no cost to The Company if there are existing aboveground wires. Otherwise, any extension shall be placed below ground at no cost to the Village.

SECTION 4: CONDITIONS ON STREET OCCUPANCY AND SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION

(a) The Company shall have the right to erect and maintain its own poles as may be necessary for the proper construction and maintenance of the television distribution system, with the approval of locating poles by the Street Commissioner or the Council of said Village.

(b) The Company shall furnish the Street Commissioner or other appropriate official of said Village an accurate plat or plan of all existing and proposed installations of structures and cables and keep the same current.

(c) The Company's poles, wires, and appurtenances shall be located, erected and maintained so as not to endanger the lives of persons, or to interfere with street improvements the Village may deem proper to make, or with facilities of the present franchise holders, or to hinder or obstruct the free use of the street. Removal of poles or equipment when necessary to avoid such interference will be at The Company's expense. All installations of equipment shall be durable and installed in accordance with good engineering practice.

(d) Construction and maintenance of the transmission distribution system shall be in accordance with the provisions of the National Electrical Safety Code, prepared by the National Bureau of Standards, the National Electrical Code of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, and such applicable ordinances and regulations of the Village of Amanda, Ohio, affective electrical installations, which may be presently in effect, or changed by future ordinances.

(e) All installations of equipment shall be of a permanent nature, durable and installed in accordance with good engineering practice, and of sufficient height to comply with most structures of any and all existing municipal or county regulations, ordinances and state laws so as not to interfere in any manner with the right of the public or any individual property owner, and shall not interfere with the travel and use of public places by the public and during this construction, repair or the removal thereof, shall not obstruct or impede traffic.

(f) In the maintenance and operation of its television transmissions and distribution system in the streets, alleys and other public places and in the course of any new construction or addition to its facilities, The Company shall proceed so as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the general public.

(g) The Company shall restore the surface appearance and condition of all lands within the municipality affected by this agreement to their original appearance or condition within a reasonable period of time so as not to adversely affect the flow of foot, vehicular traffic or the general convenience of the Village and its citizens. A reasonable time for such repair or replacement shall be within forty-five (45) days.

(h) The Company shall maintain stand-by service personnel to maintain service at all times. In addition, an after-hour answering service shall be retained to relay service requirements to the appropriate staff members on stand-by duty.

(i) It is the stated request of the Village of Amanda, Ohio, that all other holders of public licenses and franchises within the limits of the Village of Amanda, Ohio, will request the cooperation with The Company to allow the facilities wherever possible or wherever such usage does not interfere with the normal operations of said poles and pole lines so that a number of new or additional poles constructed include the rights of joint usage at reasonable terms.

(j) The Company shall grant to the Village of Amanda, Ohio free of expense, joint use of any and all poles owned by it for any proper municipal purpose acceptable to The Company, insofar as it may be done without interfering with the free use and enjoyment of The Company's own wire and fixtures, and the Village of Amanda, Ohio, shall hold The Company harmless from any and all actions, cause of action, or damage caused by the placing of the Village's wire or appurtenances upon the poles of The Company. Proper regard shall be given to all existing safety rules governing construction and maintenance in effect at the time of construction. The Village shall grant The Company free use of its poles on same terms.

SECTION 6: INDEMNIFICATION AND LIABILITY

The Company shall indemnify, protect and save harmless the Village of Amanda, Ohio, from and against losses and physical damages to property, and bodily injury or death of persons, including payments made under Workers' Compensation Law, which may arise out of or be caused by the erection, maintenance, and operation of television transmission and distribution facilities relating to the Village of Amanda, Ohio. The Company shall pay reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs in the event the Village is required to enforce and protect itself under this indemnification clause. The Company shall carry insurance to protect the parties hereto from and against all claims, demand, actions, judgments, costs, expenses and liabilities which may arise or result, directly or indirectly, from or by reason of such loss, injury or damage. The amounts of such insurance against liability due to physical damages to property shall not be less than Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) as to any one accident, and not less than Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) aggregate of persons not less than One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00)

as to any one person and no less than Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) as to any one accident. The Company shall also carry such insurance as it deems necessary to protect it from all claims under the Workers' Compensation Laws in effect that may be applicable to The Company. All insurance required by this ordinance shall be and remain in full force and effect for the entire life of this ordinance. Said policy or policies of insurance or certified copy of copies thereof shall be approved by Village Council of said Village of Amanda, Ohio, and then deposited with and kept on file by the Village clerk.

SECTION 7: PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

(a) The Company agrees to install signal distribution facilities, subject to satisfactory pole clearance and pole rental arrangements, and to make service available to all the residents of the Village of Amanda, Ohio. The Company shall provide a cable service consisting of no less than eighteen (18) different channels or stations at any one time.

(b) The Company agrees to commence construction within one hundred eighty (180) days of the signing of this agreement and will be substantially completed on or before the twelfth (12) month following the commencement of construction. Further, it will extend energized trunk reasonably and equitably within its franchise area where there are twenty (20) or more homes per lineal mile until the area is served by energized trunk cable.

(c) The Company shall furnish to all persons, firms or corporations, without discrimination, within the Village of Amanda, Ohio, who desire the service and pay for the same, a service capable of producing a good quality television picture signal or reception and The Company shall continuously strive to make all reasonable improvements of said system.

SECTION 8: THEFT OF SERVICE LAWS

Presently, laws enforced in the Village under local ordinance or state statute will be enforced when affidavits are filed by The Company's representative alleging such acts. The cost of such action, if any, shall be paid by The Company.

It is the responsibility of The Company to file affidavits either in the Mayor's Court or The Fairfield County Municipal Court alleging the facts necessary to sustain the charge made.

SECTION 9: ACCEPTANCE

Within ten (10) days from notification of the effective date of this ordinance, The Company shall file its written acceptance thereof, with the Clerk of Council. Upon filing of The Company's acceptance, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between the Village and The Company and shall be binding upon both.

SECTION 10: COST OF PRINTING

The Company shall assume and pay the costs of publications of this ordinance as such publications are required by law.

SECTION 11: SEPARABILITY

If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held illegal, invalid, or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the ordinance and any portions in conflict are hereby repealed.

SECTION 12: REVISION OF FCC OF FRANCHISE STANDARDS

Any modifications by the Federal Communications of the provisions of its rules dealing with franchise standards shall be incorporated into the instand ordinance within one (1) year of adoption of the modification by FCC or at the time of ordinance renewal, whichever occurs first.

SECTION 13: MUNICIPAL COMPENSATION

The Company shall pay to the Village an annual fee equal to three percent (3%) of the basic gross subscriber revenues. The first of such payments shall be made one (1) year from the date that the system begins operation and to be continued yearly thereafter on the anniversary date thereof, and in lieu of any use tax, franchise tax, luxury tax, business or occupation, license or taxes, present or future, but shall not be in lieu of any ad-valorem taxes assessed with respect to real or personal property of the licensee by the Village. The Village has the right to inspect the books or report from a C.P.A. in order to verify the gross subscriber revenues of The Company.

SECTION 14: EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowable by law.

SECTION 15: LOCAL OFFICE AND COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

The Company shall establish an office, which shall be within a toll free phone call distance of the Village. The Company shall have procedures to resolve all complaints within seventy-two (72) hours, subject only to acts of God and to circumstances beyond the control of The Company. The Company agrees to furnish a copy of its complaint procedures to all subscribers at the time of initial subscription.

SECTION 16: MANNER OF TERMINATION

The Village reserves the right to revoke the rights of any franchisee granted hereunder if The Company fails, after ninety (90) days written notice, to comply with the conditions, provisions or regulations under this ordinance. The Company, at any time during the effective period of this ordinance may terminate its agreement hereunder upon giving the Village one hundred twenty (120) days written notice of such termination, provided that The Company pay the Village, within sixty (60) days of the effective date of such termination, all sums due the Village under the provisions of the ordinance. Upon termination of this contract by either party, The Company shall cease to operate its televison transmission and distribution facilities within the Village.

SECTION 17: ASSIGNMENT

This contract shall not be assigned or otherwise transferred by The Company without the consent and authorization of the Village Council. The provisions and terms of this contract shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of The Company.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO MIDWEST COMMUNICATIONS CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, INC., AN OHIO CORPORATION, THE NON-EXCLUSIVE RIGHT AND FRANCHISE TO ERECT, MAINTAIN, OPERATE IN, UNDER, OVER, ALONG, ACROSS, AND UPON THE STREETS, LANES, AVENUES, SIDEWALKS, ALLEYS, BRIDGES AND HIGHWAYS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES IN THE VILLAGE OF AMANDA, OHIO, AND SUBSEQUENT ADDITIONS THERETO FOR THE PURPOSE OF TRANSMISSION AND DISTRIBUTION BY CABLE OF TELEVISION SIGNALS TO ENABLE SALE OF THEIR COMMUNITY ANTENNA TELEVISION SERVICE TO THE INHABITANTS OF SAID VILLAGE OF AMANDA, OHIO, AND OTHER PURPOSES, FOR A PERIOD OF FIFTEEN (15) YEARS, AND REGULATING THE SAME.

Be It Ordained by the Council of the Village of Amanda, State of Ohio, a majority of the members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1: GRANT OF AUTHORITY

(e) All installations of equipment shall be of a permanent nature, durable and installed in accordance with good engineering practice, and of sufficient height to comply with most structures of any and all existing municipal or county regulations, ordinances and state laws so as not to interfere in any manner with the right of the public or any individual property owner, and shall not interfere with the travel and use of public places by the public and during this construction, repair or the removal thereof, shall not obstruct or impede traffic.

(f) In the maintenance and operation of its television transmissions and distribution system in the streets, alleys and other public places and in the course of any new construction or addition to its facilities, The Company shall proceed so as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the general public.

(g) The Company shall restore the surface appearance and condition of all lands within the municipality affected by this agreement to their original appearance or condition within a reasonable period of time so as not to adversely affect the flow of foot, vehicular traffic or the general convenience of the Village and its citizens. A reasonable time for such repair or replacement shall be within forty-five (45) days.

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING, ADOPTING AND ENACTING THE 1986 EDITION OF THE MODEL OHIO MUNICIPAL CODE FOR THE VILLAGE OF AMANDA, OHIO; REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; PUBLISHING THE ENACTMENT OF NEW MATTER; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, The Justinian Publishing Company, of Cleveland, has prepared and published a Model Ohio Municipal Code, now including Administration, Traffic and General Offenses component codes current through January 1, 1986; and

WHEREAS, the Model Ohio Municipal Code, the 1986 edition, together with the new matter to be adopted, the matters to be amended and those to be repealed, are before the Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF AMANDA, OHIO:

SECTION 1. The 1986 edition of the Model Ohio Municipal Code, published by the Justinian Publishing Company of Cleveland, is hereby approved, adopted and enacted by and for the Village of Amanda, Ohio.

One book-form copy of the 1986 edition of the Model Ohio Municipal Code shall be certified as correct by the Mayor and the Clerk of Council, attached to this ordinance as a part hereof and filed with the permanent ordinance records of Amanda, Ohio.

SECTION 2. All ordinances and resolutions or parts thereof which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of the 1986 edition of the Model Ohio Municipal Code are hereby repealed as of the effective date of this ordinance except as follows:

- (a) The enactment of the 1986 edition of the Model Ohio Municipal Code shall not be construed to affect a right or liability accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the effective date of such enactment, or an action or proceeding for the enforcement of such right or liability. Such enactment shall not be construed to relieve any person from punishment for an act committed in violation of any such legislative provision, nor to affect an indictment or prosecution therefor. For such purposes, any such legislative provision shall continue in full force notwithstanding its repeal for the purpose of revision and codification.
- (b) The repeal provided above shall not affect:
 - (1) The grant or creation of a franchise, license, right, easement or privilege;
 - (2) The purchase, sale, lease or transfer of property;
 - (3) The appropriation or expenditure of money or promise or guarantee of payment;
 - (4) The assumption of any contract or obligation;
 - (5) The issuance and delivery of any bonds, obligations or other instruments of indebtedness;
 - (6) The levy or imposition of taxes, assessments or charges;
 - (7) The establishment, naming, vacating or grade level of any street or public way;
 - (8) The dedication of property or plat approval;
 - (9) The annexation or detachment of territory;
 - (10) Any legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. Pursuant to Ohio R. C. 731.21, 731.22 and 731.23, the Clerk of Council shall cause to be published a notice of the enactment of this ordinance, containing the title of the ordinance and a summary of the new matters covered by it, which summary is attached hereto and marked "Exhibit A."

SECTION 4. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, such emergency existing by reason of the necessity of providing a Municipal Code that is consistent with the latest State law, as required by the Ohio Constitution, and this ordinance, including the 1986 edition of the Model Ohio Municipal Code adopted hereby, shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage by at least two-thirds of all members elected to Council, otherwise from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

PLANNING OF STATE SEWER PROJECT BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF
AMANDA, OHIO AND THE OHIO WATER DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

That it is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this ordinance were passed in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Section 3. That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety of said Village for the reason that the immediate construction of the waste water treatment and sewage collection facilities at the earliest possible time is necessary in order to protect the health of the inhabitants of the LGA by providing adequate disposition of waste water; wherefore, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and immediately after its passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 88-3

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE VILLAGE OF AMANDA, OHIO TO ENTER INTO AN ENGINEERING AGREEMENT WITH URS CONSULTANTS, INC., COLUMBUS, OHIO FOR PREPARATION OF A FACILITIES PLAN FOR WASTEWATER IMPROVEMENTS AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, The Village of Amanda is in the fundable range for the Ohio EPA's FFY 89 Construction Grant Funds; and

WHEREAS, The Village of Amanda intends to apply for FFY89 Ohio EPA Construction Grant Funds; and

WHEREAS, The Village and URS Consultants, Inc. are scheduled to meet with EPA to discuss the availability of Construction Grant Program funding.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Amanda, Ohio:

SECTION 1: That the Village of Amanda hereby authorizes the Mayor to enter into an Engineering Agreement with URS Consultants, Inc., Columbus, Ohio, for preparation of a Facilities Plan for wastewater improvements.

SECTION 2: That the Facilities Plan will be completed in accordance with EPA requirements for a cost not to exceed Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000).

SECTION 3: That Village approval of the Engineering Agreement is contingent upon award of an Ohio Water Development Authority (OWDA) Planning Loan for the Facilities Plan and authorizes URS Consultants to proceed with the Facilities Plan at their own risk prior to approval of the planning loan by OWDA.

SECTION 4: That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety of said Village for the reason that immediate wastewater treatment improvements be made at the earliest possible time is necessary in order to protect the health of the inhabitants of the Village by providing adequate disposition of wastewater; wherefore, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and immediately after its passage.

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT THE 1988 REPLACEMENT PAGES FOR THE MODEL OHIO MUNICIPAL CODE PUBLISHED BY THE JUSTINIAN PUBLISHING COMPANY; TO REPEAL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH AND TO DECLARE AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, during the year January 1, 1987, through December 31, 1987, the General Assembly enacted numerous State laws that affect the Model Ohio Municipal Code, previously adopted by the Municipality;

WHEREAS, the Municipality is in need of having an up to date Code, one which is consistent with the latest State law, as required by Article XVIII, Section 3, of the Ohio Constitution, so that prosecutions can continue to be made under Municipal ordinance rather than State statute; and

WHEREAS, The Justinian Publishing Company has published a set of 1988 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, which Replacement Pages incorporate the latest State law through January 1, 1988, and, pursuant to authority previously given by the Municipality, has furnished the Municipality with sets of such Replacement Pages equal in number to the number of copies of the Model Code previously ordered by the Municipality;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF AMANDA, OHIO:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to Ohio R. C. 731.23, the 1988 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, prepared and promulgated by The Justinian Publishing Company of Cleveland, Ohio, are hereby adopted by and for the Municipality.

SECTION 2. All ordinances, resolutions and parts of ordinances and resolutions which are in conflict with any of the provisions of the 1988 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, adopted in Section 1 hereof, are hereby repealed. Those ordinances, resolutions and parts of ordinances and resolutions which are not in conflict with any provision of the 1988 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code are hereby expressly excepted from repeal by this ordinance and shall continue in full force and effect until otherwise amended or repealed by Council.

SECTION 3. The enactment of this ordinance, including the 1988 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code adopted herein and the repeal provided for in Section 2 hereof, shall not be construed to affect a right or liability accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the date of such enactment, or any action or proceeding for the enforcement of such right or liability. Such enactment shall not be construed to relieve any person from punishment for an act committed in the violation of any such legislative provision, nor to affect an indictment or prosecution therefor. For such purposes, any such legislative provision shall continue in full force notwithstanding its repeal for the purpose of adoption of the 1988 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code provided for herein.

SECTION 4. Pursuant to Ohio R. C. 731.21, 731.22 and 731.23, the Clerk of Council shall cause to be published a notice of the enactment of this ordinance, containing the title of the ordinance and a summary of the new matter covered by it, which summary is attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A."

SECTION 5. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, the reason for the emergency being the necessity of having an up to date Code, one which is consistent with the latest State law, as required by the Ohio Constitution, and this ordinance, therefore, and the 1988 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code hereby adopted shall become effective immediately upon its passage by at least two-thirds of the members of Council, otherwise from and after the earliest period allowed by law.



that those residents of the Village wishing to participate in Beggars' Night activities shall visit only those residences within the Village on which front residence porch lights are illuminated.


